

SISTERS CELEBRATE 75TH ANNIVERSARY OF ARRIVAL IN US



God writes straight with crooked lines. This quote, attributed to St. Teresa of Avila, sums up the beginnings of the Oblate Sisters' foundation in the United States. On March 12, 1951, five Oblate Sisters gathered in Childs, Maryland, to share the legacy of St. Leonie Aviat and spread Salesian Spirituality. And unique they were: five Sisters from five different countries: Switzerland, France, Hungary, Austria, and England. Sr. Teresa Elizabeth and Sr. Frances Theresa arrived first, in September of 1950, to study at Catholic University. Sr. Bertha Gonzaga, Sr. Jane Stanislaus, and Sr. Mary Bertha set sail and landed a year later in New York Harbor.

Crooked lines? Sr. Jane Stanislaus and Sr. Mary Bertha entered the Oblates to serve as missionaries in South Africa. After completing their nursing formation and fittings for white habits, God invited them to change

directions and go west, not south. But missionaries they were: pilgrims settling into an unknown land, trunks filled with the bare necessities. One difference from early American missionaries: the Oblate Fathers and Brothers welcomed them warmly, offered temporary lodgings, and the Mothers' Guild helped make their home warm and welcoming. These three Sisters lived on the Oblate property in a little house called Villa Maria until a sizable property was given to the Congregation by Mr. Howard Bathon, Sr. The Sisters moved into the main building on the property in December 1952 and, with the Oblate novices at their service who made it feel like home, named it Villa Aviat. Many crooked lines led to this foundation: the first convent of the Oblate Sisters in the United States.

formally blessed the new space and we announced its new name! See page 4 for the exciting details.



The Oblate Sisters' kindergarten opened in 1954 with three children, Mount Aviat High School in 1960, Sisters moved to Delaware City to open an elementary school...and God continued to write with crooked lines. MAA transitioned into the Blue Ribbon elementary school it is today with frequent twists and turns. Oblate Sisters served in St. Anthony of Padua and Padua Academy in Wilmington, St. Bernadette in Drexel Hill, founded Holy Cross Academy in Fredericksburg, and currently spread the strong Salesian Spirit at Immaculate Heart of Mary in Towson. Sisters have dedicated themselves to teaching Religious Education in parishes and summer camp programs.

As a young religious, Sr. Jane Stanislaus' prayer was: "God, I am ready to serve, but, please, not in the kitchen." Her reason: she wanted time in the chapel on Sundays. Another crooked line: the morning after settling in, Sr. Jane Stanislaus became the cook, and mother, to over 50 young postulants and novices who left their homes to discover Oblate life as a priest or brother. Over her 30 years of service, she helped form hard workers, built strong bonds of Salesian love, and left cream puff and apple pie recipes that have taken on a life of their own. In her spare time Sister sewed habits, built the grotto, and organized large meals and celebrations. Sr. Mary Bertha, an educator at

heart, studied, taught, coached, and encouraged generations of young minds. After-school hours included college courses, visits to the sick, cooking, gardening, and whatever else needed to be done. Her high standards, ready smile, and strong work ethic were a shining example of seeing God's will in the turns and curves of life! They are both a hard act to follow.

We are fortunate to have their journals and notes, which detail those early days:

Here in our 6-year-old Foundation in America, our years pass much more quickly than they do for most 6-year-olds. We have a lot to write about because we are the busiest and happiest we have ever been in the United States...

We pray vocations flourish, so the story God confided to us as he continues to write our story with crooked lines begins a new chapter. Stay tuned...

A NEW ERA BEGINS AT MAA: THE GLEBER FAMILY EARLY LEARNING CENTER OPENS!

At this year's Ice Cream Social, PreK parents were in for a special treat and it wasn't just ice cream! Parents were invited to tour the PreK building thanks to our amazing summer help in the form of dedicated alumni and teachers who worked feverishly to put the finishing touches on each classroom as the clock ticked toward a new school year.

Indeed, the project was the biggest expansion the school has completed since the addition of Holy Family Hall in 1993! The project allowed a growing, critical PreK population to go from one classroom of 4-year-olds to three classes—two 4-year-old classes and one 3-year-old class—helping to ensure the sustainability of Mount Aviat Academy. And on January 8, 2026, Father Paul Colloton, OSFS finished the last step in this process: he formally blessed the new building and playscape with the entire school population and special guests gathered around. Principal Sr. John Elizabeth took this opportunity to thank those who contributed to the successful completion of the project.

First, when the proposed building project needed a steady hand, MAA Board member Mike Hanby didn't hesitate to step in and lead the way. Mike meticulously oversaw every detail of the process, ensuring that the building met the highest standards—all while keeping costs in check and personally pitching in whenever a job needed to get done. In addition, Jake Gies and Mike Kelly of Nowland Associates put their outstanding construction and management skills to work at every stage of the preschool's

transformation, ensuring top quality and attention to detail. And of course, outfitting the new classrooms required a lot of furniture. The team at Lakeshore Learning went above and beyond to help the Sisters, finding exactly what we needed at incredible discounts.

And just when Sister thought the work was finished, another adventure awaited—a playground for the preschool! That's when MAA parent David Squitieri and his partner, Evan MacGuinness (brother of MAA grad Erin '92), from Design Concepts dove in with creativity and heart. They didn't just design a playground—they envisioned a playscape full of wonder, complete with donated slides, a hand-built hill featuring a rock climb, and a boulder scramble. They even managed to move thousands of pounds of repurposed turf. And when Sr. John Elizabeth found a fantastic deal on used boats, the Fritts family and Mr. Allen rolled up their sleeves and painted and restored the boats until they looked like new. To top it all off, the Design Concepts team constructed a dock using reclaimed materials. Their teamwork and generosity truly brought outdoor dreams to life.

Sister worked with the teachers to think of ideas such as spaces for art and music. The playground needed a bridge to cross the swale. So, the school joined forces again with Mr. Fritts, whose motto could easily have been, "If you can dream it, he can build it." No matter if the weather brought heat, rain, gusty winds, or freezing cold, Mr. Fritts was always there, using his incredible talent to create joy for the students. Finally, this project would have been possible without funding. The Auction and Golf Committees poured their hearts into raising support, working to keep this dream alive. The Oblate Sisters shared this story far and wide—through letters and online—reaching generous souls across the nation. Donations came, from modest gifts to thousands of dollars.

One family in particular generously chose to champion the early childhood expansion in a truly remarkable way and for that generosity, Sister John Elizabeth announced that the

Oblate Sisters were proud to name the brand-new preschool the Gleber Family Early Learning Center. For years, the Gleber family were devoted MAA parents and volunteers, and they continued to support MAA long after their last drive through the carpool lane. Mr. and Mrs. Gleber and their children—Jason '97, Jonathan '99, and Jamie '00—all proud MAA graduates—have left a lasting impact at Mount Aviat. Sr. John Elizabeth closed the ceremony with a promise to honor the legacy of the Gleber family by nurturing generations of children in a space that is “safe, inviting, and truly inspiring.”


